Workshop feature



Do you have droopy door handles? It seems to be a common fault on the Minor – particularly on the 4-door models (probably due to it having twice as many doors!). The return spring which holds the chromed handle against the small black buffer often gives up and leaves the handle to rattle around unrestrained. This is not a 'show stopper' since it doesn't affect the operation of the door itself, but it is a nuisance and it may annoy some owners (OK, just me then!). The cure is to take

the handle out of the door and refit the spring, which has almost certainly not broken but has come out of the tiny channel cast into the body of the handle to restrain it. The design seems a bit weak since the soft alloy is pressed over in order to stop

the spring from 'escaping'. This was probably ok for the design life of the car, but I have seen lots of failed handles like this. The white car in the picture had 2 out of 4 doors like it (Photo 1).

Removing the door handle doesn't sound like much of a job to anyone who has not troubled the inside of a Morris Minor door before. They are rather complex and sadistic devices and unfortunately, the front door handles will only come out when the window frame is removed.

doors are a tad easier, but you still have to dismantle a fair bit of the door to extricate them from their resting place. Assuming you have got the handle to be repaired out of the door and have applied Elastoplast to all your wounds (other sterile dressings are available!), treat yourself to a cup of tea and a lie down in a darkened room. When you have regained your composure, you will see the problem (Photo 2), and the little spring can be safely tucked back into its channel (Photo

3 shows one which has not flipped out before). However, the chances are that it will only stay there until you have finished replacing it, put the door back together and then slammed the door with a satisfied flourish of the wrist, whereupon it will doubt-(*Continued on page 7*)


(Continued from page 6) less escape again returning the handle once again, to its limp, former self, leading to further gnashing of teeth and the prospect of repeating the above



process. How do we fix that then? I hear you cry. My solution, which seems to work, is to drill a small hole (Photo 4) and fix a small, self tapping panheaded screw to hold the spring in place. You have to use a fairly short screw since if it is too long, it



will foul the operation of the chrome handle (Photo 5). The screw has to be fitted close to the channel (Photo 6 & 7) so that the 'pan'





head holds the spring in place. Approximately 3mm length seems to work and a hole diameter of 2.5mm was used. I have successfully done this on two cars now and it seems to work. (Editor) Good luck.

Orbs birthday



As last month marked ORB's 60th birthday I thought it would be a good idea to pen a little article for the newsletter about her history so far:

ORB 596 was built at Morris Motors at Cowley on 16th August 1950 and despatched to Kennings Ltd, Clay Cross, Derbyshire on 17th August 1950 and registered by them on the same day.

The car was then sold to John Eric Scott of Potters Bar, Middlesex on 31st August 1950. John Scott was a wealthy man who decided to have the colour changed from black to Tudor Grey to match his Rolls Royce! Several improvements were made including the fitting of an interior light, a Smiths glove box lid clock, a Smiths cigarette lighter and door pockets custom made to fit. Mr Scott kept the car for 17 years before selling it to Derrick Wyndham-Lee of St.Albans, Hertfordshire on 16th June 1967. Mr Lee kept the car for the next 30 years. In 1997 Mr Nigel Morley from Cliftonville in Kent heard about ORB which by then had been parked up in a lock up garage, unused for the best part of 10 years. A new floor was fitted and the wiring bodged up to get her going again before she was put back into service. Mr Morley seems to have done very little mileage in the car – only about 1000 miles.

I had been on the look out for a Lowlight for some time and after a chance telephone call to Mark at Canterbury Convertibles I found myself in Kent looking at ORB. I bought her on the spot and took the decision to drive her all the way back to Bournemouth. We nearly made it but broke down just as we reached the top of Poulner Hill! This was in July 2000 and I used her for the remainder of the rally season before taking her off the road in Octo-

(Continued from page 8) ber 2000 for a rebuild. A brand new 918cc sidevalve was found to replace the very tired original unit. This is actually an ex WD unit. They were used as starting engines for Chieftain tanks believe it or not! She was completely rewired returning it to completely original specification including the removal of the horrid flashing indicators that had been fitted and the reinstatement of the



semaphores. The interior was also fully reupholstered as the original was beyond salvation and of course she was resprayed in the original colour of black.

It's hard to believe that I've now had ORB for 10 years. I've attended many rallies with her since then and of course she was used as one of the main cars at our wedding. She took pride of place in the marquee at Beaulieu in 2008 for the 60th anniversary display we put on and has appeared in the press on several occasions. There are 1 or 2 little patches of rust now starting to appear again and I hope to get these sorted out soon. I'm also planning to repaint the engine in grey - everyone always moans that I've painted it the wrong colour despite the original engine being painted blue as well.



I don't plan to part with ORB any time in the near future and hope to keep driving her around for many more years to come. Happy Birthday ORB! (Laurie)
