

Grille Badge -Fitting Advice

Minor '1000' It is recommended

that the badge be fitted using the 'cropped' penny washer supplied. This will enable the badge to be fitted to the front of the slatted grille without having to get access to the back (ie removing the radiator). We would also recommend using a spring washer (not supplied) or some 'Loctite' to keep it tight. You may wish to put some insulating tape on the back of the badge to isolate it from the grille slats – all as shown in the photos. When the washer is behind the grille turn it through 90 degrees so that the

washer safely spans the two slats each side and tighten the wing nut.

get access to the back of the grille, which, unless your fingers are exception-

ally small will mean removing the radiator. The other option is of course, a badge bar.

A Minor Triumph! - Groom tracks down his stolen classic motor

A man was re-united with his stolen Morris Minor after fellow classic car enthusiasts turned detectives and scoured the country to track it down. Bridgegroom Liam

Reynolds, 36 was devastated when his pristine Traveller was taken the day before it was due to ferry him to his wedding. So he posted an appeal on the Morris Minor Owners Club website describing his iconic

car, which cost £7,000 to restore. Louise Matthews, an eagle eyed enthusiast, spotted it parked near home in Wanstead. North London and called the Police. Delighted Liam - taken to his wedding in a mate's clapped out Toyota - was texted news of its return on the second day of his three week honeymoon in Brazil.

He said: "I've had the Morris Minor for 18 years. It has been in the family since my grandparents bought it in the early 1970's. My family were devastated, but I had to park my emotions since I was getting married the next day". Liam, a data marketer from East Dulwich. South London, spent years restoring the car, which has a rare, custom made sunroof. It had gone to the garage for repairs, but was stolen the day before he wed fiancee Sadia Salaam. Liam said: "Louise kept watch on it for



2 hours until Police arrived to collect it." The car buff, who has now inserted a tracking device in the vehicle for security, added: "I have bought Louise £100 of vouchers to say thank you. She has given me back a valuable piece of family history.

RESTORED VAN GOES UNDER THE HAMMER

Hundreds of buyers packed British Car Auction's Blackbushe auction centre on Monday 13th September for the sale of a beautifully restored Morris Minor post van. The Royal Mail had donated the van for sale with all the proceeds going direct to Barnardo's, the Royal Mail's chosen children's charity sale attracted collectors and enthusiasts hoping to secure the van, which was sold in the correct vintage livery from forty years ago. It raised £8,000 for Barnardo's following some very competitive bidding in the auction hall. the sale

The 1970 Morris Minor van was finished in pillar-box red and was used for deliveries in Christchurch, Bournemouth & Poole during its initial six years service. It then went into private ownership for a number of years before going back into the Royal Mail fold in the late Eighties when a team of four dedicated Royal Mail employees at the Isle of Wight workshop worked in their spare time to restore the van to its former glory. Morris Minor mailvan SLJ 430H was part of a batch of 1,350 vans ordered by the GPO of which the first 250 came with London registrations AMD 1-250H. The rest of the order followed after the GPO ceased to exist in October 1969 and 270186 was allocated to Head Postmaster Bournemouth & Poole on 12th January 1970 who registered it SLJ 430H on 4th February 1970. It was based at Christchurch delivery office during its Royal Mail service. SLJ 430H replaced an earlier Minor (GYF 58C) and was itself replaced in October 1975 by a Bedford HA 50cf. mailvan LJT 412P (5011308) with Bournemouth & Poole at Christchurch. No doubt it was retained for use over Christmas and it was sold by the Post Office on 26th January 1976. About twenty years ago, it was repurchased by the Post Office and it migrated to Newport (IoW) workshop where its restoration was completed. It was used on the island for publicity events but spent most of its time in the workshop building under cover.

Since its restoration, completed in 1992, the little red van was used by the Royal Mail at local displays, fetes and festivals and it has raised money for charity at a number of events around the Isle of Wight and other parts of the UK.



SHAFTESBURY CARNIVAL (2ND OCT)



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
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Here is an old favourite spotted by Neville in a 1981 Borg and Beck Manual and is quite important for your Moggie's well being - particularly if you are having trouble selecting gears.

(Incidentally, the first thing to check is that you have sufficient (engine) oil in vour gearbox. (Editor)



Insufficient release bearing/ release plate clearance can cause

an 'overstroking' condition leading leading to inability to select gears. Other problems could be driven plate damage or clutch slip.

Correct clearance is achieved by setting the clutch pedal free travel, which for 1098cc vehicles must be 35-38mm $(1^3/8)$ to $1^1/2$ measured at the pedal pad. For 948cc cars the setting must be 19mm ($^{3}/_{4}$ "). Use the nut and locknut in the diagram to achieve the correct clearance.

TINA'S TRAVELLER

To look at 'Pearl', our much loved 1970 Traveller you may have thought that she was in pretty good condition apart from a few minor rust spots which we planned to rectify with a re spray. On the advice of Nev, we duly presented Pearl at Nidor Bodyworks in Poole to have her beauty makeover. So far. so



straightforward we thought! Unfortunately, on closer inspection by Martin and his team several problems came to light. The wings were hanging on by rusty lace and the headlights looked unlikely to survive another pothole, so precarious was their grip on the wings.

The grille was corroded at the back and the aluminium side panels were beginning to break down. Further investigation revealed the beginnings of rot on the inside of the wooden door pillars at the lower ends. Beauty was certainly only skin deep! A " case conference " was held which felt rather like visiting an old friend before surgery. Martin offered advice and suggestions, mindful of the fact that our budget was not limitless. As Pearl is



mechanically sound we decided to go ahead with replacement of the wings, grille, headlamps and welding to one small area. The colour was to be matched closer to the original Smoke Grey. A decision about the wood was put on hold. The estimate for completion was at this point doubled.

When we saw the superb paint finish achieved by the Nidor team there was no way that we could put the old, dark and tired wood back on, so arrangements were made to transport Pearl to Woodies in Chichester with the help of Brian Whiteside for complete new wood. The completion time was doubled again, the budget totally blown, summer holiday downsized and Club Rally missed. The beauty makeover had now become major surgery, familiar I am sure to anyone who has ever done anything to a vintage vehicle.



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On transfer day we arranged to rendezvous with Brian at Wood-

ies and set off before him. Cruising along the A27 we were startled to see



27 we were startled to see Pearl fly past on Brian's trailer at a most impressive speed. Fortunately she was well strapped down! Steve Foreman and his son James made a magnificent job of the wood and those tricky roof gutters, producing the lovely pale ash colour that I particularly wanted. They are traditional craftsmen.
