

Editor's In Box

As you may know we have a 1954 convertible. When it was put away last year it was not running well and seem to drop down to a couple of cylinders. This only happened when I was putting the car



away so I put it down to it having a sulk. As it is needed for the Film I dragged it out last weekend. It started first pull and I left it ticking over for about 15 minutes. When I tried to take it up the road it cut out after dropping down progressively to three, then two, then one cylinder. It would not restart. Jackie towed it back to the garage. Over the 40 years that we have been together she has become very proficient at this. I put the car away, leaving the battery on charge. Next day it started fine and I left it ticking over for about 15 minutes. It did stall, I managed to re-start it but with some difficulty and it wasn't happy. The car has a 948cc engine re-built less than 10k miles ago, compressions are good. It has a luminition ignition that has covered over 70k miles. It has a "blue" Beru coil which is about 2 years old. Distributor cap, plugs, rotor and leads are all about two years old and looked in good condition. It was last refueled in August of last year. The carb. was reconditioned about 5k miles ago and the dashpot had oil in it. So what was the problem?

I started with the rotor which was unmarked as to manufacturer. I replaced it with a red rotor supplied by the 'Distributor Doctor'. Result: perfect, a ten mile run didn't cause any problems. I would not have thought that this type of fault could be down to the rotor and only changed it because 1) it was of unknown origin,2) was easy to change and 3) I had to start somewhere. Careful inspection of the rotor does not give any clues apart from a slight "burning" of the brass contact, certainly not something that I would have thought would cause a problem. Hope that this helps someone.

Editor's Note: Rotors do have a habit of 'dying quietly' for no apparent reason. I think it is due to tiny cracks which allow the HT to 'escape' down inside the distributor. I have consulted the Branch Spares Manager on this one, he tells me that the club stocks 3 different rotors, (1) the black 'Lucas' rotors @ £2 each, (2) the red Accuspark ones at £4 each and (3) Distributor Doctor ones at £7.20 a pop. The black ones seem to be 'persona non-grata' at present! (2) & (3) seem to be most popular. Some members have reported trouble with the rivet falling out of the black ones so these are recommended for keeping as a spare only in the glove box in case of emergency. (We have plenty—surprise surprise!)

What's the Difference between a Minor & a Beetle?

OK, so there are quite a lot of differences between them, but they have a lot in common. (1) about the same size, (2) about as fast as each other (3) arguably they rust at about the same rate. The VW engine and gearbox has to be fitted from underneath (and at the back!)—whereas, the Minor engine and box is, as everyone knows, is fitted from above—being dropped into the capacious engine bay with the benefit of an engine crane. the marvellous benefit of hindsight, he would have left off the cylinder head to get a reasonable clearance under the front crossmember when dragging the assembly into position under the car (supported on large axle stands, of course).
