Editorial

Hello and welcome to the July Newsletter. Thanks to Nick Odell for the write up on the Minors on Tour which took place in early June (and to Dave Walker for the photos). A group of us made the annual trip to the National MMOC gathering at Cornbury in Oxfordshire last month. It incorporated the main MMOC Morris Centenary celebrations as well-and so a good showing of Morris' was anticipated. It certainly lived up to expectation. I bought a few more Centenary grill badges—I have a limited supply at £11 each. I also got hold of a few copies of Ray Newell's commemora-



tive booklet "Celebrating One Hundred Years of Morris" which are available to members for £6 each. I hope you like the first of a series of tech articles on problems with the back axle (of the Minor). It seems that these come up quite frequently and are not so difficult to solve as you might think. The first concerns 'Missing Bump Rebound Rubbers'. We usually carry the bump rubbers, U bolts and pads in the club spares if you need them. Sorry, but there will be no spares table at the July clubnight meeting but we will be having the usual spares set up at our Rally and again at the August clubnight.

We have had a few issues with the web site recently, which (to spare you the technical details) means that it can't be updated at the moment. I am working on a new version of the site which I hope to upload soon!

Looking forward to our Branch Rally on the weekend after next, so lets have a good turn out from the Branch. Please don't forget to support the various Branch stands with cakes, bric a brac, raffle prizes and also items for sale by Roy in the 'Instant Auction'.

stripped the car for its first rebuild back in the eighties; they had to be removed



with an angle grinder. As can be seen from the photo, the rubber on this car had de-bonded from the steel mount - which was still securely held in place by the 'U' bolts. Of course, if you are planning to replace the springs you may want to remove the spring completely at this stage. (See later).

To start, you will have to (safely) support the body weight, preferably on axle stands - clear of the axle itself. The front spring mounts are a good

place. Of course, when you release the 'U' bolts, the weight of the car will try to push the spring downwards so a trolley iack under the differential casing is a good idea as is a scissor jack under the spring. This will permit a controlled descent. Some 'U' bolts have separate locking nuts and some will have 'nyloc' type nuts. Make sure everything is cleaned or replaced as necessary. The rubber pads which insulate the spring from the 'U' bolt assembly should be re-





the spring mounting brackets should be carefully evaluated. We have a look at this issue in a future article.

When you tighten up the nuts, make sure you do them up evenly and use new nylocs or re-fit the lock nuts. While you are there, you could check the link bushes on the shock absorber link arm. Also see if the shock absorber is leaking and replace or top up with jack oil if necessary.

Next month we will take a look at the next item on the list which is worn spring shackle bushes.

placed if damaged. Sometimes you will find that the steel plates through which the 'U' bolts are threaded are corroded and of no further use. When reassembling, I usually put a bit of grease over the metal bits, particularly between the new mount and the axle casing. Moisture can be trapped here causing corrosion and loss of thickness to

Rear Axle Problems

Before we start this one, don't worry, I am not going delve into the inside of the axle and fiddle with the differential. Whilst it can be done on a diy basis, it probably warrants its own article – but is outside the scope of my ability (Ask Eddie Pateman if you want to know more!)

Leaving aside braking problems, there are probably only about five things that go wrong with back axles. (I say 'probably' to cover myself in case there are obvious ones that I have missed.) So (at the risk of this sounding like the Monty Python sketch about what the Romans did for us)..

apart from: Missing rebound bump rubbers,

Worn spring shackle bushes, Insecure axle casing due to corroded spring mounts, Oil leak from differential seal and Oil leak from hub seals

MISSING REBOUND BUMP RUBBERS

We have a 1957 four door Minor in our collection. This has been owned by us for over 30 years and gets the most use. It was, however, only when we were called upon to carry 3 adults and two children on weekend trips, we noticed a bone-jarring bang every time we traversed a large bump or pothole in the road. The first thing I thought of was – exhaust. A quick look underneath showed that it was securely restrained and unlikely to contact any other part of the underside when the car was loaded up. There appeared to be no other obvious issues. Hmmm! Anyway the banging continued until it annoyed me enough to have another look. This time,

someone at a club run had suggested I have a look at the bump stops. I did this, and noticed that *both of them* were missing! (the rubber bits, that is). Now, I maintain, in my defence that if one of something is missing you are more likely to spot it than if both sides are missing and they match in their absence (if that makes sense!). I am running with that excuse anyway. I'll just put down not noticing it the first time to a 'senior moment'.



So, armed with a pair of new ones, I set about

replacing them. It is not too difficult a job, but depending on whether the rear axle has been apart before, or not, you may need to have some new 'U' bolts, nuts and spring pads on standby also. This particular assembly had been apart before and the 'U' bolts were still greased and shiny. I recall, a long time ago, when I originally
