This morning there was an e-mail confirming that my money had been refunded to my account!

So if you can't get any response from the supplier contact the magazine editor where the advert was placed (in this case My Weekly). They take these complaints very seriously.

I hope that this helps some other members.



The Austin has finally gone off to a new home having been sold by vintage car dealer Robin Lawton on my behalf. If anyone is looking to sell a really good quality vintage or classic vehicle I can thoroughly recommend Robins services.

That's all from me for this month so until next time Happy Minoring, Laurie.

Bluemels soon completely outgrew the Stepney site and the search was on to find a suitable larger factory site. This finally came in 1902 when an old, failing artificial silk weaving factory situated near Coventry became available. Coventry was favoured because it was then an established major manufacturing area for cycles, motor cycles, and also seen as rapidly becoming rather important for motor car construction at the time. Apparently the brothers were taken aback by the sheer size of the premises and plot at first. They need not have worried as over the years the space was easily grown into, as particularly their cycle accessories became even more known and in greater demand worldwide.

Selected motor car and additional motor cycle accessories rapidly followed incorporating celluliod in specific items used as electrical insulation (i.e. separators within the Bluemels accumulator) The policy was always to produce a quality product and this included Bluemels spark plugs, motor cycle and side car windscreens and fittings, larger vehicle size tyre pumps and in the 1920's a successful range of car steering wheels (celluloid coated) mainly supplied direct to car factories.

This led to the famous Bluemels 'Silverstone' and 'Brooklands' steering wheels within the 1950's that various models of MG cars had factory fitted.

Experimentation of various formulas of their plastics used for making parts were gradually improved at the Wolston site. From the 1930's Bluemels vehicle number plates demand increased to become the industry choice and by the late 50's and 60's most retail showrooms were fitting Bluemels either the raised individual number and letter de-luxe version or the standard stamped alloy flat sheet type. The vast majority made up for the newly ordered car on the garage premises using one of the patent Blue-

Bluemels Brothers Ltd. factory, Wolston, Nr Coventry. closed down operations in the 1980's. There is no doubt that Bluemels Brothers were one of the few early pioneers in producing such a popular range of specifically marketed lightweight products at the time utilising a modern new alternative material with such successs.

The brothers would no doubt be amazed at the many diverse types and forms of 'Plastics' that are now so widely used and such an every day part of our lives.

The old Bluemels site has now been used partly for housing with the remaining area another one of our many 'business parks'. The only mention of the old company is one road named within the complex -'Bluemels Drive'

#### 'A-Z' of British Industrial Legacies-Roger Kellow

We continue our look into the past at recognisable accessory and parts manufacturing companies found listed as exhibitors during the London Motor Shows during the 50's and 60's (during the hey-days of Morris Minor production). Company names very often that had much earlier beginnings and can still be found today and on original items. Old names that are very familiar to the present day Morris enthusiast

Following 'Armstrong Patents' last time, we now find listed, looking next under the 'B's, in our A-Z guide copy of an original Earls Court London Motor Show guide, another name, one that I know to be on a part on my own Minor. The name is 'Bluemels' stamped on the black/silver number plates and like many others, I am pleased to say, are still on my Minor Saloon - obviously having been fitted by the Morris retailer who originally supplied the car in the latter end of the 1960's.

Bluemels Brothers originally set up business in Stepney London in 1860 as cycle dealers. The brothers were soon experimenting with methods of shaping and moulding celluliod producing their own range of lightweight cycle mudguards,

this led to other useful items such as chain and dress guards, mud guards and also tyre pumps etc. etc. All were immediately found to be extremely popular and to have the main advantage over competitor's products as being so lightweight but adequately strong.

Bluemels exhibited regularly at all the prominent cycle and motorcycle exhibitions starting from the latter half the 1800's onwards. Such was the demand that followed for their innovative celluloid touring cycle, racing cycle and motor cycle accesso-

Given that at the turn of the century, 'our' William Morris had been a racing cyclist himself for a while, an early progressive cycle builder, then a motor cycle builder, it is easy to assume that in this capacity, he most probably would have been very aware of the famous early Bluemel's products at the time. W Morris also went on at that time to exhibit his own latest models of cycles and then his Morris Motorcycles at the same type of London Cycle and Motor Cycle Shows that the Bluemels Brothers frequented later within this same era.

Here is the info we discussed re those oil companies contacted over the last few weeks re the situation regarding bio-ethanol present in their brands of regular and premium unleaded petrol, sold at the pumps at this present time :-

**Texaco** - Both Regular & Premium unleaded have 5% ethanol added.

**BP** - Regular contains 5% & Premium - "is liable to be variable within our supply chain & we are unable to quote any universal content figure at this time, only that the situation is at present evolving "

Shell - Both Regular & Premium unleaded grades contain 5% ethanol

**Tesco** - Regular unleaded contains 'up to' 5% ethanol & the premium grade contains 9% ethanol.

Esso - Regular unleaded grade contains 5% ethanol

<u>However our premium grade does \*NOT contain any ethanol at present including Dorset (\*</u> please note, with the exception of the following areas - Cornwall & Devon, Teeside areas, and the whole of Scotland where 5% ethanol is at present added - We are not intending to otherwise add ethanol to our premium grade, with the exception of these areas until legislation is in force to require this higher grade of unleaded petrol to contain ethanol in a specific percentage.)

Many thanks for your reply to our enquiry clarifying the position re ethanol within your Esso 'super' grade of unleaded petrol. Our many classic car club members now know that there is a grade of fuel that they can definately purchase within our particular area if they have an issue in the use of Ethanol within certain classic models at the present moment

As usual Historic Brooklands held an auction on Saturday 7th March with some good quality vehicles coming under the hammer , one of which was the Millionth Minor built. Word has it the hammer price was £23,000 but including buyers premium was £25,000 + .Personally I think it was sold for plenty of wedge as it wasn't perfect and had visited a hedge and ditch in the '70s.

Brooklands has just benefitted from a £4.68 million lottery grant so it is onwards and upwards for the Surrey venue - good for them as all these venues must be kept.
