And meeting like-minded Morris lovers too, we bet. "We have world-famous authors, musicians, comedians and media types among our clientele – my father once drove Princess Diana around the grounds of Viscount Linley's estate," remembers Zac. "There were many people who had the 'pleasure' of being taken on a test drive by him and came out the other side with white knuckles and a fresh impression of what a Minor could do on the roads – the company was so well-known in the early days that letters would just arrive addressed to 'the Morris Minor Man, UK'. A letter sent from Japan even got to him with just some hand-drawn sketches of the Morris Minor badge!"



In a nutshell, the beauty of owning a Morris is that you are owning a piece of history. "The design is a throwback to coach built lines and curves, and wherever you are in the country, you can pull up to a traffic light or into a carpark and have people crowding round and telling you anecdotes about their auntie's, father's, grandmother's Morris," says Zac.

"This social aspect is augmented by the large Morris Minor Owners Club and its rallies, as well as all the regular classic car meets. The driving style is unhurried and appeals to those who don't want to rush at the pace of modern society, and – even though the youngest model is 45 years old – they have surprising reliability. The smell is instantly recognisable too.

To an owner who has a close relationship with their car, perhaps to the point where it feels like a member of the family, all these things add up."

We have to say, life with a Morris does sound pretty appealing. Think our run-of-the-mill modern motor might have outstayed its welcome...

Bristol at Work: **7ac** Ware from the Droclaimers

Zac Ware might be best known as the guitarist in The Proclaimers, but he has another, quite different, passion too – for the humble Morris Minor – inherited from his father, Charles Ware, who started an automobile restoration business in Bath back in 1976. "While he was searching for a new business idea, he went to some local car auctions and found that Morris Minors were still very cheap but reliable," says Zac, who now directs

his dad's company from its Brislington base. "He'd always loved classic cars, and in the early '70s had imported American classics until the OPEC oil crisis meant that gas guzzlers were no longer economical to use. The Morris fused his love of design, cars and conservation."

Starting out with three cars, the business soon grew to become the leading Morris Minor restoration company in the UK, inspiring others to preserve the future of the British icon. "When my father fell ill in 2010, my partner Lucy and I moved from Glasgow to Bath to look after him," explains Zac. "We soon found ourselves looking after his business interests and began to run the company full-time in 2011."



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Nowadays there's an 'a la carte' menu to give customers an understanding of all the work that can be done on their beloved vehicle. "We help them choose the most essential work to make the car safe and functional, depending on their goal and budget," says Zac.

"They have the choice about how far they want to take the restoration and whether they wish to add any of the extensive upgrades to adapt their Minor to modern driving conditions – for example, disc brakes, telescopic suspension – and can plan a staged restoration over many years. Recently we restored a Minor Million and have another one in production that will also be fully restored. Seeing a customer's pride and joy – dragged out of a garage or barn – driving off our premises in all its new-found glory, is always the best bit."

I've gone and bought another Minor! I was supposed to sell the "8" first but that plan went a bit wrong! She's a 1954 Series II 2 door saloon that I have known for the last 30 years or so. She is in very good condition having never been welded and with all the original, rust free body panels.

The only thing letting her down is the paintwork! She will need a bare metal respray back to her original birch grey. She's still running on an 803cc engine which is in very good order, sounds lovely and pulls very well along with the "magic wand" gear box. I'm planning to put the "8" into auction but if anyone is interested in a very nice, Bournemouth registered car please let me know.

I think that's about all from me for this month, so until next time.

- **Puncture—one wheel nut is too tight and you can't shift it**: if all you have is a silly L-shaped wrench, "borrow" a piece of wood from the nearest fence and use it as a lever across the wrench. Grease the nuts tomorrow. Carry an "instant" puncture repair aerosol and drive home slowly.
- Fan belt snapped: don't be a hero and repair it with your (wife's) tights! Be prepared for them melting after a mile or so. A short piece of tow rope is better, especially the sort that splices into itself. Wrap it around the water pump and crankshaft pulleys only and make it home on sidelights without the dynamo. Make a note to carry a spare.
- 5. No lights: probably a blown fuse. The headlight fuse is separate from the fuse box in the loom just below and this is usually the cause though god knows why. There should be a spare in the fuse box itself, end on and facing you. Use that and replace it tomorrow.
- **Split water hose:** empty the system completely to get rid of any anti freeze. Repair the split with PVC tape, bandages, torn rags, anything. Refill with plain water from the nearest farmhouse and leave off the radiator cap. This should see you for quite a few miles, but I hope you thought to fill an old plastic bottle and carry that along too, so you can continue to top up!

'Get you home' tips

Through personal experience it's become very obvious that my local KwikFit Fitter is about as much use as a set of metric Torx Bits when it comes to even basic servicing of a 1950's car. Trouble is, unlike 1965, all the neighbours have a company Audi and not a clue about points and plugs either. There's no-one to turn to.

A Regional Directory of word-of-mouth approved back-street garages would be the answer and perhaps we should, at some stage, work towards that. Not a lot of help when the starter motor won't turn or the car coughs to a standstill after a few miles every day. So perhaps, a few get-you-home tips on simple problems that the franchised dealers can't fix. So put a copy of this article in your glove compartment, so you can take it into your local bog standard garage with the car!!

1. **Starter won't turn:** chances are your battery is flat, there is corrosion on the terminals or on the cables between battery and starter. To get you home, dig out the handle, open the bonnet and insert the handle in the hole in the bumper until it engages in the dog at the front of the engine. Turn the ignition on, set the choke if you have a cold engine and make sure it's out of gear. Turn the handle clockwise gently until it's at the bottom and then pull quickly upwards. You may need to do this several times. Starter turns but engine doesn't fire. If everything is cold and damp it's probably ignition. Wiping the inside of the distributor cap with a dry towel has been known to work. Wipe the outsides of the HT leads too, the large black wires in the left of the engine. Have someone else spin the engine on the starter, you can often see an HT leak as a spark along the leads. If everything is hot it'll be petrol.

Leave the ignition switched on and listen for the petrol pump ticking. No tick? Thump it with the wooden handle of a hammer or big screwdriver until it ticks several times in succession.

2. Engine runs but cuts out or misfires after a few miles: this could be lots of things but most likely a worn float chamber valve. Not an easy thing to replace by the roadside even if you carry a spare. Revving the engine helps clear away the excess fuel and might get you a few miles before it happens again.
