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



Dopular family cars unable to use new fuel. according to study

Many popular family cars are unable to use a fuel that could be introduced to forecourts to cut carbon emissions, according to new research. Some Volkswagen, Ford and Nissan vehicles are among those that aren't compatible with E10 petrol, which is designed to be less harmful to the environment.

The Department for Transport (DfT) launched a consultation last month on its proposal to encourage larger forecourts to sell E10 to help the UK meet climate change targets.

Regular petrol sold in the UK contains up to five per cent bioethanol – a type of renewable fuel – to reduce carbon. E10 involves increasing the proportion to ten per cent and is widely available across much of the European Union and other countries including the USA and Australia. The majority of vehicles in use today are approved to be fuelled with the petrol, but some older vehicles aren't.

New analysis by motoring research charity the RAC Foundation shows that many cars still in regular use are incompatible with the fuel. It found that by 2020 there will still be an estimated 28,066 Volkswagen Golfs on the road that would be affected, the most of any model. Other models in the top 10 incompatibility list include the Nissan Micra (15,785), Rover 25 (9,879) and Ford Escort (8,947).

The DfT is proposing to introduce a requirement for larger filling stations to continue to stock standard petrol in an E5 grade if they decide to add an E10 option, in a bid to ensure the owners of older vehicles can continue to drive.

Steve Gooding, director of the RAC Foundation, said: "As and when E10 appears on the forecourts, drivers need to know whether their cars can use it without being damaged. This analysis shows that even in a couple of years' time there will still be hundreds of thousands of cars on our roads that are incompatible with the new fuel. Whilst some of the cars incompatible with E10 fuel will be historic models, many will be old but serviceable everyday run-arounds that people on a tight travel budget rely on to get about. The good news is both that the vast majority of cars on our roads are able to run on E10 and that transport secretary Chris Grayling has recognised the need to protect the users of those older vehicles which are not E10 -compatible. It will be interesting to see whether the current consultation generates support for the government's proposed way forward."

A DfT spokeswoman said: "This government is ambitiously seeking to reduce the UK's reliance on imported fossil fuels and cut carbon emissions from transport. But drivers of older vehicles should not be hit hard in the pocket as a result. The E10 petrol consultation will give a better understanding of the impact of E10 on the UK market, and to ensure that drivers are protected if any changes come into effect."

- 9. Rover Mini (7,614)
- 10. MG TF (7,568)

Me and My Car: Mavis the Morris Minor

At our respective ages of 66 and 33, Mavis the Morris and I have the honour of being the oldest car and the youngest member of the Rotorua Morris Minor Club.

Having been part of New Zealand's vintage and pinup scene for the last eight years, I am easily recognised around Hamilton as the woman who wears brightly coloured swing dresses with fouffy petticoats and flowers in her hair.

My love of the 1950s aesthetic continues through to my tastes in music, film, home decor and of course, cars. Having attended several Beach Hops where I admired the large, shiny American classic cars on display, the idea of one day owning my own classic vehicle was just a pipedream. Until one day, when I discovered Morris Minors while browsing TradeMe's classic car category. Suddenly the notion of possessing a genuine 1950s automobile seemed a lot more realistic. And even affordable.

I put together a mental list of must haves for my dream car. Dating from the early 1950s was a must; a 50s girl could not be seen driving around in a 60s car! I also required four doors and original white on black number plates. Ideally the "flippy outty" indicators would also be a feature, and the fewer modifications, the better.

After months of searching, the perfect car appeared, listed in Papamoa. My husband and I both know nothing about cars, so we enlisted the help of a knowledgeable friend to examine the vehicle and before the previous owner knew what was happening, the 1952 Morris Minor was being driven back to Hamilton.

Not by me however.

Having passed my driving test in the year 2000, when it seemed no one owned a manual transmission, I had never driven a manual before. Three driving lessons later, I was gingerly behind the wheel, but feeling grand!

Being part of a vintage loving community spread across the country, I had several "careful lady owners" of classic cars to call on for advice before the big purchase. The most valuable advice came from another Morrie owner in Wellington, whose advice was to allow extra time when travelling for conversations with passers-by.

Everybody has a Morrie story, and people are delighted to see Mavis on the road. You see, Mavis the Morris is in (nearly) mint 1952 condition. Kept in storage for 25 years, no modifications have been made and at the 2017 NZ Morris Minor Convention, she won 1st Place in the Best Standard Original category. A wonderful addition that came with the car is the original log book which was started on the day she was purchased, 24th July 1952. Each oil change, repair and maintenance check was dutifully logged with the current mileage recorded. A tradition I have proudly continued.

Ask, and I am quick to claim that Mavis is not only the most special car I've ever owned, but also the cheapest.

Purchase price was just over \$4000 and a year's registration costs a mere \$29 (with change). Mavis flies through warrants, costs about \$35 to fill with petrol and thanks to being part of a large, friendly, generous club, parts are a breeze to source.

She doesn't have seatbelts, airbags, power steering, a heater or a radio. She isn't the fastest on the road, going from 0 to 70mph in about 10 minutes; and the wooden steering wheel may give you blisters, if driving gloves are not worn, but the friendships made, the admiring glances, the joy of recollections from those who remember the Morris Minor's heyday; not to mention the style, flair and personality that only come with a vintage vehicle are beyond measure.

The sense of pride at being a custodian of a piece of history and the idea that this is most likely the exact make and model I would have driven if I were around in the 1950s makes Mavis more than just a car, but a valued and treasured part of my life. And of my husband's life too.

However, the sooner we get a t-shirt made up which reads "It's not my car, it's the wife's" the better!
