#### Don't Have a Breakdown

For those that missed my 30-minute presentation at the last Club Night on what to do if you have a breakdown in your Minor, here is a brief summary of the relevant points.

Firstly, the Minor is probably (and arguably) the most reliable classic you could find and failures are usually preceded by something unusual. Possibly a strange smell, an unusual noise, loss of power, flames coming out! In which case, you now have the option to choose the place where you grind to a halt. Don't cross you fingers and hope it will 'sort itself out'. It probably won't. It helps if you have at least a cursory knowledge of what is going on under the bonnet and where the main components are located and what they do. Don't leave it until you have actually broken down. It's going to be too late then.

The first job is to make sure you are somewhere safe (as Arthur Cox observed, you can often use the starter motor with the car in first gear just get off the roundabout or junction where you will be cursed a little less by the passing motorist and waved at with not all the fingers of one hand). A guick look under the bonnet can often reveal a loose wire, leaking fuel, steam, etc etc. A safety warning triangle is a good idea if you have one. You can buy a cheap folding one and keep it in the boot – they don't take up much room. Make sure you put it a reasonable distance from the car if the road is greater than 30mph speed limit.

Remember your safety is most important if you don't feel confident to 'have a go' then summon assistance straight away. If you are on a motorway (whatever that is!) the advice is to get out and hop over the Armco on the side.

I wasn't trying to detail every type of breakdown that it is possible to suffer, just to discuss the most likely culprits. Assuming you haven't run out of petrol, this is usually the HT electrical system and often involves loose leads, failed coil or condenser etc. One of the first checks should be the petrol pump which is a bit of an Achilles' heel. It should 'tick' every few seconds on first switching on the ignition.

When the weather warms up a bit and the evenings get lighter I have got a few jobs to do on both cars when time permits!

If all is silent, try tapping it gently with a blunt object (on the metal part not the plastic cap). If it starts ticking, you might be away again — but probably only a few hundred yards before it happens again. If home is more than a few hundred yards away, you can remove the plastic cap on the

pump and try to clean the contact points with a nail file or something abrasive. Don't be tempted to run the pump for any length of time (other than to test it) with the cap off – you will lose the little pivot pin which holds the points in the pedestal and then you will be in trouble!

If everything looks intact then you might suspect the coil/condenser. A few years ago, it was fair to say 'It's never the coil'. However, these days the quality of such items is suspect and new coils seem to fail quite regularly. The same goes for the condenser, and it pays to buy a good quality one to start with. You can try to see if you have a spark by taking No.1 plug out, reconnecting the HT lead and cranking the engine on the starter.

This isn't always a conclusive test, as there might still be a weak spark. If there is no spark on the plug – then you are on to something. The best solution if the coil or condenser is suspect is to substitute one or both for a known 'good' one. If you are really well organised, you might have in your toolbox a condenser with soldered crocodile clips that you can attach the wire to the 12V terminal on the distributor and the body to a suitable earth point. You don't have to disconnect the one in the distributor and this may get you home.





We then went on to talk about things you should keep handy in the car – eg. Breakdown organisation membership card, phone, warning triangle, torch, tyre repair foam can, blanket, water, starting handle etc.

If you might 'have a go' yourself – a few tools would be handy – i.e. plug spanner, screwdrivers, pliers, duct tape, cable ties, AF combination spanners, adjustable spanners, (and BSF spanners if there is room). A few spare parts is always a good idea – if you cant fit them yourself, the AA man might be able to fit them for you. (He is unlikely to carry any spares for 'our' cars). We reckoned that hoses, fan belt, petrol pump, coil, condenser. Parts should be new or 'known good'. The best advice is to buy a new one (ie petrol pump/coil) fit the new one, and keep your old one as a spare.

We didn't mention electronic ignition - which is a whole session on its own! Some systems are more reliable than others, but if you are worried, the best advice is to carry a spare, working distributor (with good points and condenser) so if the system fails, the spare distributor can just be popped.

I think, at this point, I reminded the meeting of the title of the talk which was 'How not to have a breakdown'. The message I wanted everyone to take away was the philosophy of preventative maintenance. If the car is well maintained, it might still break down, but the chances are infinitely less. I have devised a simple servicing chart (based on the workshop manual) which was dished out to those that wanted it and it is available to download from the website on the 'Technical' page (Minor Servicing Check sheet). There are a few more articles on technical subjects on that page also, that might be of interest.

We then talked about the differences between classic cars and new cars — the main point being that older cars need more attention than newer cars and you need to view running them from a different viewpoint. Also, the lack of requirement for an MOT doesn't relieve you (the driver) of responsibility to maintain the car. Hence the need to show that you have either serviced and maintained it yourself by using the check sheet (ticked off, dated and signed) or a voluntary MOT or garage servicing record.

Hopefully, you will never be in need of breakdown assistance, but if you do, hopefully your knowledge of how best to handle it will be slightly greater.
