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
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BRANCH REBATE SCHEME


The MMOC Dorset Branch

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THE 'BRIAN WOOD' REPORT



Every so often, we start doing a job and it causes so many 'ripples' that we wish we had never started. As we are planning to drive the EOS 444 – the Million, to the British Motor Museum in Warwick for the MMOC

National Rally in July, I thought it would be a good idea to give it a good service and check over.

The car was obviously well maintained and serviced by the previous owner and there were no significant running issues with it. So, I did all the usual things – change the oil and filter, plugs, points, condenser rotor arm etc. The distributor cap looked a bit aged so I changed that for a new one. I greased the steering, checking for play, split boots etc and all was well. The gearbox was full – as was the master cylinder. I then went to check the rear axle and reached for my special, homemade plug remover. The filler plug on these is an approximately 10mm square drive for which there are purpose made spanners with various sized drive 'squares' at each end. My home-made one is welded to a 19mm nut which permits easy removal with the appropriate spanner. Or so I thought! Gentle force with a normal ring spanner didn't work so I tried it with my longer 'breaker' bar with the ½" square drive. This failed, but mainly because the home-made insert is not a particularly good fit into the plug and the increased torque tends to make it slip out. The next step with this type of situation is to reach for the cordless impact driver (previously known as the 'windy gun'- when one has to hook it up to the compressor). Now there are two possible outcomes under impact driver conditions: (1) It is successful (2) Something breaks. In this instance – it was (2) – something broke. The sustained force of the impact driver shattered the square drive plug, making any further progress impossible. Since I was fairly certain that it contained sufficient oil for now, I left the next stage until another day. So having recovered my composure, there was no practical alternative other than to remove the differential.

This is fairly straightforward – if a little long-winded. The axle half-shafts have to come out, so this was done and the offending differential placed upon the bench. I cleaned up the damage and filled the re-

mains of the square part of the plug with weld. It was probably because the welding current was up to the maximum that I managed weld the tip on the welding torch to its swan-neck (The bit it is screwed into). This meant that further progress had to wait until this 'ripple' had been dealt with. I ordered a new swan-neck and packet of tips from Machine Mart, but in the meantime, managed to cobble the welder back together in order to complete the original task. I then built the blob of weld on the plug up and carefully shaped it to make a short 'column' about 10mm high. I could then fit a large nut loosely over the top of it and continue filling the hole with weld — which would now, of course, stick to the nut. This seemed to do the trick and with further use of the impact driver and the now considerable heat cycle inflicted upon the stubborn plug — it was finally liberated from the differential casing.

Now don't get me wrong, but I have nothing against doing fastenings up tightly. But how tight is tight enough. So long as you have used new spring washers or Loctite, you don't have risk stripping threads. However most fluid retaining threads are usually tapered. This means that you don't have wind them up to the torque necessary to hold the wheels on to a London bus. With a tapered thread, the friction comes in gradually so they are very unlikely come loose of their own volition if they are tightened 'adequately'. Whoever did the filler plug on the Million must have either used an impact wrench of have muscles like Arnold Schwarzenegger. Here endeth today's lesson. Bye for now,
